Service delivery is paramount to the municipality. I also want to extend my gratitude for always giving us consistent support and interest in the gradual development within the District.

This includes conducting awareness campaigns and outreach programmes aimed at recognizing diverse aspects of humanity, nature, and cultural history.

The attendance of the IDP meeting signals growth and development in our communities. This is gauged by the level of engagement from the members of the communities.

President of Netball South Africa, Mme Cecilia Molokwane, visited the Harry Gwala District to celebrate 30 years of democracy. The aim was to empower young netball players and promote social responsibility within the

community, especially with the upcoming Netball World Youth scheduled to take place in Gibraltar, September 2025. As an internationally recognized figure in the world of netball, her attendance was a testament to the significance of the event and proves that the District has a legacy of producing renowned sports legends and still produces a young generation that can take this community to the world map.



District convenes strategic session, IDP and Budget Roadshows to map improved implementation of service delivery

AS we return from the easter holidays, I hope you had a blessed and rejuvenated break, citizens of Harry Gwala District. The Harry Gwala District Municipality (HGDM) recently completed its Integrated Development Plan (IDP) Roadshows with our local municipalities, focusing on addressing community concerns and providing the community with service delivery updates.

The IDP roadshows, which took place from the beginning to the end of April 2025, provided an opportunity for us as leadership, management, and officials of the municipality to engage with the community, report back on their suggestions, needs, and to ensure that we meet their expectations.

The community provided valuable feedback and listed their needs in terms of service delivery, for the municipality to consider when approving the budget.

These Roadshows are an essential part of the integrated development planning process in municipalities, as per the provision of the Municipal Systems Act, 2000. The Municipal Structures Act, 117 of 1998 also plays a role in outlining the structure and functions of the municipalities including their responsibility in ensuring community involvement in the IDP's consultation processes.

As we are in the fourth quarter of the financial year 2024/2025, our finance department is busy preparing and amending budget-related policies, as per the Municipal Systems Act (No. 56 of 2003), which in parts states that: -

- 1) The Municipal Manager of the Municipality must prepare or take all reasonable steps to ensure preparation of the budget-related policies of the municipality, or any necessary amendments to such policies, by the legislation applicable to those policies for tabling in the municipal council by the applicable deadline specified by the mayor in terms of section 21 (1) (b) of the Act.

This ensures that our financial planning is aligned with legislative requirements and community needs.

The Harry Gwala District Municipality held a policy review strategic session in May 2025. It was aimed at developing policies /improving policies that can stand the test of time, serving a greater good rather than individual interests. The session went very well, as policies were amended accordingly and approved as per the legislative guidelines. Having such sessions always plays a crucial role in shaping our municipality's future and ensuring effective governance. Before this session took place, a risk strategic assessment was undertaken on the 13th of March 2025 till the 14th of March 2025, to identify rising risks and to mitigate those risks by adhering to the risk register of the municipality.

A call for action, the commitment and dedication of our employees are vital in achieving the municipality's goals and objectives. We encourage our staff members to take ownership of their work, ensuring they are always productive and present. As we move forward, we remain dedicated to building a better future for the Harry Gwala District community. WATER RESOURCE MANAGEMENT

SOUTH Africa is a water-scarce nation that faces complex water resource management challenges. These challenges necessitate a holistic approach based on the National Water Act, Integrated Water Resource Management (IWRM), and sustainable practices to ensure equitable access and long-term water security.

Key Legislation and Framework:

- **National Water Act (NWA):**
The primary legal framework for water resource management, emphasizing sustainable and equitable use for the benefit of all.
- **National Water Resource Strategy (NWRS):**
Provides a framework for the protection, use, development, conservation, management, and control of water resources.
- **Integrated Water Resource Management (IWRM):**
Promotes the coordinated development and management of water and land-related resources to maximize economic and social welfare while ensuring ecosystem sustainability.
- **Water Services Act:**
Provides a regulatory framework for the provision of water supply and sanitation services.

Key Challenges and Issues:

- **Water Scarcity:**
South Africa is a semi-arid country with low rainfall and limited underground aquifers, making water resource management an important factor in ensuring sustainable water supply for all.
- **Climate Change:**
Increased climate variability, including droughts and floods, poses a significant threat to water resources. Climate change needs to be factored in every aspect of water resource management as its impact is already experienced across the country.
- **Population Growth and Urbanization:**

- **Infrastructure Challenges:**
Deficiencies in water infrastructure and management can lead to water losses and reduced efficiency. Aging and inadequate water infrastructure contribute to the water shortage. Many areas /communities experience significant water losses due to leaks and inefficiencies in the distribution system

Water Resource Management Strategies and Practices:


- **Water Conservation and Demand Management:**

- **Water Quality Management:**
Protecting water sources from pollution and ensuring the quality of water for various uses.
- **Groundwater Management:**
Sustainable extraction and management of groundwater resources to supplement surface water supplies.
- **Rainwater Harvesting and Greywater Recycling:**
Exploring alternative water sources to diversify supply and reduce reliance on traditional sources.
- **Catchment Management:**
Managing water resources at the catchment level, considering the interconnectedness of water bodies and ecosystems.
- **Stakeholder Participation:**
Involving various stakeholders in water management decisions to ensure equitable and sustainable water use.

A decade of the Harry Gwala District Marathon was celebrated recently at the finish line at uMzimkhulu FET in Sayidi during this year's instalment of the ever growing race.

The race was won by Sinethemba Tshangase from Umzimkhulu who ran the coveted 42.2km race and walked away with an amazing R60 000 for first position and his finishing time was 02:20:48.

The first runner up was Ntsindiso Mphakathi whose finishing time was 02:21:01 and Sphamandla Nkosi came in third position his time was 02:21:13.

The ladies 42.2km race champion was Rhonex Kogo coming all the way from Kenya, who also walked away with the prize money of R60 000 with her finishing time being 02:42:11.

Second position being taken by Jenet Mbhele she walked away with R30 000 finishing the race with a time of 02:49:59 and in third position was Nobukhosi Tshuma who received R15 000 with her 02:53:21 finishing time.

Harry Gwala District Municipality Mayor Cllr. Zamo Nxumalo said it was amazing that this race has reached 10 years and it is even more exciting that this race is growing each year.

"I really cannot believe that we are 10 years old now, we have to celebrate this milestone especially now that



the race is growing. We obviously need to do so much more to grow it even further and reach more athletes so they can participate," said Mayor Nxumalo.

THE Municipal Systems Act (MSA) (Act 32 of 2000) requires all municipalities to prepare and annually review Integrated Development Plans. Section 24 of the (MSA) further holds that the planning undertaken by a municipality must be aligned with, and complement the developmental plans and strategies of other affected municipalities and other organs of state so as to give effect to the principles of co-operative government contained in Section 41 of the constitution.

The act further enjoins the executive committee or executive mayor of a municipality or, if the municipality does not have an executive committee or executive mayor, a committee of councillors appointed by the municipal council, in accordance with section 29 to-

- Manage the drafting of the municipality's Integrated Development Plan;
- Assign responsibilities in this regard to the municipal manager; and
- Submit the draft plan to the municipal council for adoption by the council.

Section 26 of the same Act further direct municipalities on the core component of the integrated development

plans, and it state that-An Integrated Development Plan must reflect-

- (a) The municipal council's vision for the long-term development of the municipality with special emphasis on the municipality's most critical development and internal transformation needs;
- (b) An assessment of the existing level of development in the municipality, which must include an identification of communities which do not have access to municipal basic services;
- (c) The council's development priorities and objectives for its elected term, including its local economic development aims and its internal transformation needs;
- (d) The council's development strategies which must be aligned with any national or provincial sectoral plans and planning requirements binding on the municipality in terms of legislation;
- (e) A spatial development framework which must include the provision of basic guidelines for land use management system for the municipality;
- (f) The council's operational strategies;
- (g) Applicable disaster management plans;



Community members attended in numbers for integrated development planning across all the district.

- (h) A financial plan, which must include a budget projection for at least the next three years; and
- (i) The key performance indicators and performance targets determined in terms of section 41.

Chapter 4 of the Municipal Systems Act further state that “a municipality must develop a culture of municipal governance that complements formal representative government with a system of participatory governance, and must for this purpose-

- (a) Encourage, and create conditions for, the local community to participate in the affairs of the municipality, including in-

- The preparation, implementation and review of its integrated development plan in terms of Chapter 5 of the Municipal Systems A

The Integrated development planning/sdf roadshows for the 2024/25 financial year started on the 1 April 2025 until 24 April 2025. The district together with the Local Municipalities including uMzimkhulu, Greater Kokstad and Dr. Nkosazana Dlamini-Zuma and Ubuhlebezwe, visited different halls addressing community members, the community also had an opportunity to ask questions and get clarification on service delivery issued

HARRY GWALA CONTINUES TO MAKE STRIDES TO CURB WATER CHALLENGES

THE Harry Gwala District Municipality's political leadership and management continue to roll-up their sleeves to find a lasting permanent solution for water and sanitation challenges.

This comes in the wake of the procurement of four water trucks as a temporary intervention to ensure provision of water to the citizens in a speedy manner.

This is one of the positive results yielded by the Harry Gwala District Water during their Indaba that the Municipality should also concentrate on enhancing the municipal plant and equipment capabilities while future plans to fully overcome water challenges are addressed As per the plans.

Each of the 18000L water trucks has a capacity to deliver water to three different villages in a day. The officials will work in a shift system which will also curb overtime drastically as the municipality's cost-cutting measures are a pivotal spin-off for the additional fleet.

Moreover, the Municipality is set to get rid of hiring and outsourcing equipment since it is exorbitant to do so.

The official handover of the trucks became eventful and exciting to some members of the community to know that their plight for water scarcity is a priority.

The Harry Gwala District Municipal Manager, Mr Gamakulu Sineke, Municipality Speaker, Cllr Sibongiseni Mdunge, Water Services Chairperson, Cllr Simphiwe Bekwa and Senior Management were also excited over the

auspicious occasion.

The District Municipality Mayor, Councillor, Z.D. Nxumalo said the temporal intervention does not mean there are no future plans in place.

“The project of about 35 springs protection and boreholes is in place to ensure that people receive clean water,” said Cllr Nxumalo. He further confirmed that the purchasing of water trucks is part of the Water Indaba resolutions.

Cllr Nxumalo appealed to local communities to report any element of the misuse of the trucks, emphasizing they will also engage the local municipalities to report any elements relating to the misuse of the trucks.

He said the vision is that no one should be without

water. As a Water Services Authority (WSA) and a Water Services Provider (WSP) in the Harry Gwala District it the Municipality's duty and responsibility to ensure the provision of water and sanitation services throughout the District are undertaken.

The four water trucks were allocated to areas of concern where water challenges are rife. “This should not paint any false picture that some other areas have no challenges of water, they are there but are manageable,” said Cllr Nxumalo.

- Storage of filtered water in a clear well
- Backwashing facilities for the pressure filters including air scouring
- Disinfection of treated water and dosing equipment
- Pumping of final water to existing storage reservoir
- Water treatment plant residual handling and wash water recovery (sludge, backwashing and rinsing water);

The final treated water shall be disinfected by means of chlorine gas and transferred from the filtered water storage tank to the existing treated water reservoirs for distribution to the community. The scope of works for the high lift pumping scheme comprises the following:

- Restoration of the design capacity of the pumpstations, including refurbishments where required.



Sibongiseni Mdunge, in his welcoming remarks emphasized the significant role women play in the economy and the importance of their voice in budgeting for women's programmes. The chairperson of the Women's Commission, Cllr. Z.P. Dlamini, stressed that positive change can come from such commissions.

Key topics that were discussed during the session included:

- Women Participation in Key LED economic drivers
- EPWP objectives

The Women's Commission is a section 79(a) committee that reports directly to the Council. The committee is functional, meets quarterly, and has a budget for each financial year. It comprises 13 female Councillors, one female Head of Department (HOD), one acting HOD, Chief Operations Officer, Deputy CFO, female senior managers and a representative from the Harry Gwala Development Agency (HGDA).

The main objective of the Women's Commission is to elevate the involvement of women in leadership and strategic key positions in local government, address gender equity in local government, and capacitate female political leaders to inspire women in their respective wards and communities. The commission also seeks to establish fully functional section 79(a) committees for all family municipalities of Harry Gwala District.

HARRY GWALA DISTASTER MANAGEMENT INDABA A SUCCESS

THE Harry Gwala District Municipality today, convened an Indaba under the theme “EVERYDAY COUNTS, ACT FOR RESILIENCE TODAY” at the Amble Inn Hotel in iXopo recently. The Indaba, hosted by the Harry Gwala District Disaster Management Center, the KwaZulu-Natal Department of Cooperative Governance and Traditional Affairs’ Provincial Disaster Management and the National Disaster Management brought together disaster management professionals, emergency service practitioners, private sector representatives, sector departments, researchers, and thought leaders.

Speaking during the Indaba the Harry Gwala District Municipality Mayor Cllr Zamo Nxumalo said: “It is a great honour to participate in the Indaba as it provides an opportunity to engage with all kinds of disaster practitioners to discuss this crucial matter that we face as the KwaZulu-Natal Province. As local government we are necessitated by the unpredictable weather conditions as proven in recent years to strengthen the capacity of local government in disaster risk management. This is a great platform to bring innovative ideas to control disaster incidents and share ideas that will save lives of our communities. Disaster management is everybody’s responsibility”.

The aim of convening the Disaster Management Indaba was to bring various subject matter experts to engage and chart effective response strategies to disasters under the 2025 Theme “Everyday Counts, Act for Resilience Today”.


It was stated as well during the Indaba that the Disaster Unit is in an advanced state to respond better

and effectively to disasters in future, be it fire, floods or any other disaster incident that threatens the lives of communities. In the past and currently as well, the province has been affected the most by the disasters that struck the country, and the Indaba was a meeting of the minds to find pre-emptive solutions so that when disaster strikes all systems are in place to prevent or react. The presentations from the various stakeholders illuminated the importance of effective early warning systems, risk reduction, and building resilience.

The focus on building the capacity of local government to deliver essential services and to respond to disasters adequately was also highlighted as an important way forward. They also engaged on incident reporting protocols and how the information and communication system assist in ensuring that there is synergy and efficient response to incidents.

The Indaba consolidated the local government’s perspectives on the ongoing review of the country’s disaster management system and addressed pressing issues affecting the District. The arrival of the rainy season quickly translates into widespread flooding across the country, with each year bringing with it more severe impacts on vulnerable communities.

While disaster management professionals work tirelessly to mitigate risks and respond effectively, lives remain lost, critical infrastructure is left damaged, and services are disrupted. Restoring normalcy and rehabilitating infrastructure remains challenging due to the significant social and economic implications. The burden on the national fiscus is also becoming unsustainable in the long run.



DISASTER REPORT

DURING the month of February 2025, the Harry Gwala District Municipality experienced hailstorm, heavy rains, strong winds, structural fire, drowning and lightning incidents which affected all four local municipalities within the region.

A total of 74 households were affected, and 34 of these households were destroyed, while 43 households were partially damaged. Of the affected households 13 were left homeless, and 417 people affected. During the reporting period and after conducting assessments of damages, it was ascertained that there were no fatalities and injuries.

uMzimkhulu Local Municipality experienced a drowning incident on the 2nd of February 2025 during the same period. In an unrelated incident, it was reported that three individuals lost their lives while performing a cleansing ritual at the Ngwagwane River in Esidikideni, Ward 2 in uMzimkhulu. Their bodies were later discovered and confirmed dead by the South African Police Services (SAPS).

INCIDENTS OCCURRED IN MARCH 2025

During the month of March 2025, the Harry Gwala District Municipality experienced several severe weather-related incidents, including heavy rainfall, strong winds, structural fires, drownings, and lightning strikes. These incidents affected all four Local Municipalities within the district: Dr. Nkosazana Dlamini-Zuma, Greater Kokstad, uMzimkhulu, and Ubuhlebezwe Local Municipalities.

On 11 March 2025, the South African Weather Service (SAWS) issued a Level 2 disruptive weather warning, effective from 00:00 on 13 March to 14 March 2025. The warning aimed to safeguard the public, as the anticipated adverse weather conditions posed risks to human lives, potential structural damage, and other associated hazards. In response, the Provincial Disaster Management Centre (PDMC) activated a Provincial Joint Operations Centre

(JOC) at 08:00 on 12 March 2025. Local municipalities and relevant stakeholders were alerted, and emergency response teams were placed on standby.

A total of 120 households were affected with 79 structures totally destroyed, 72 structures were partially damaged, 39 households were left homeless, and 654 people affected. Two fatalities were reported, one fatality as a result of structural fire in Ward 5 of uMzimkhulu and one drowning fatality was also reported under the Dr Nkosazane Dlamini-Zuma Local Municipality's Ward 11. The Municipality also experienced road accidents that occurred along the R56, R612 and R617 roads within the Harry Gwala District Municipality's area of jurisdiction.

direct communication with the citizenry in improving their lives for the better continues to be the bedrock of the Harry Gwala's District Communicators Forum.

The Forum, which convenes quarterly held their recent meeting on the 4th of March 2025 at Ubuhlebezwe Fire and Rescue Disaster Boardroom Under the Harry Gwala District Municipality. The District Communicators Forum fosters intergovernmental relations between district municipalities and local Municipalities in the district and brings together communicators to strategize and enhance communication skills.

Communicators have a platform to present to the forum their Municipalities achievements, highlights and also share best practices.

The engagement is primarily centered on encouraging public participation in the affairs of government by the citizens of the Harry Gwala District Municipality.

Major Government stakeholders formed part of the session such as The Independent Electorate Commission (IEC), South African Social Security Agency (SASSA), Department of Health and Cooperative Governance and Traditional Affairs (COGTA) whose representatives in the meeting engaged to support the functionality and effectiveness of flow of communication received and distributed strategically to the public with intent.

The mandate of the Forum is to gather and capture timely, accurate and accessible information for the public at large. Such sessions play a pivotal role in shaping and closing gaps with the volume of information shared. This means that the Forum refines information before it is disseminated to communities.

The obligation is to educate the public about policies, programmes, service delivery and initiatives from all three spheres of government.

The engagements are held quarterly within the financial year to purposefully gather data and to share initiated government programmes pertaining to all citizens of South Africa.
